On behalf of the Council, I wish to report to you on the following:

ASM 2002/2003

The accounts indicates that the 2002 ASM has left a healthy surplus. This will be put to good use for the College and Society.

The preparation of the ASM 2003 has started in earnest. Being a joint meeting with AOSIVA, we will expect more overseas speakers. The format will be slightly different from previous meetings. Plesase watch out for the notices.

Institute of Clinical simulation

The Institute of Clinical Simulation has been well utilised. Apart from regular ACRM courses, a Difficult and Advanced Airway Management workshop was held recently. Subject to the final decision of the Organising Committee, if an airway workshop will not be held in conjunction with the ASM, it will be organised separately. The possibility and logistics of introducing the EMAC course designed by ANZCA is being considered actively.

Continuous Medical Education

The Medical Council has decided that from January 2005 all medical practitioners will be required to have satisfactory CME as a condition of renewal of their annual practicing certificates. CME for specialists has been running well for several years with different groups having different starting time of their cycles. These will have to changed to synchronise with this staring date. There is a separate notice in this newsletter that gives the details. Early notice is given so that Fellows can plan their CME activities to meet the pro-rata requirements leading up to December 2004.

Fellowship ad eundum

There is an important notice in this newsletter concerning admission of Fellows *ad eundem*. Our College has been unique amongst Academy Colleges in that we admit Fellows *ad eundem* regularly in significant numbers. This was due to the shortage of supply of anaesthetists and the regular employment of specialists from overseas. It would be beneficial to the development of the specialty in Hong Kong to include them in our College. The existing rule that governs the number of Fellows that can be admitted this way has always been exercised in a manner that does not hinder their admission.

As our own training system matures, we are producing our own specialists steadily. It will become hard to justify regular admission of Fellows without going through our own training systm. Furthermore, the rules in the Hospital Authority has made it very difficult to employ new specialists from overseas. The need will decline. After much debate, Council has decided that the number of Fellows admitted eash year will be limited and will be subject to review regularly. This will allow flexibility to admit individuals who will have a significant contribution to our specialty. A notice giving all the details is published in this newsletter.

This does not affect medical practitioners who received training under other systems to obtain specialist status in Hong Kong. The specialist register is controlled by the Medical Council. While fellowship of the academy means automatic entry into the specialist register, non-Fellows may apply to Medical Council for assessment of their training and qualification. If these are considered comparable, specialist status will be granted.

Examinations

There is a record number of candidates for both the Intermediate and Final Examinations. These examinations will be run with the same number of external examiners and the structures as before. Due to the number of candidates, the arrangement for the OSCE may have to be altered slightly.

This is my last message as President of our College. I wish to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the Council of my last two terms and the Boards and Committees. They have given me advice and support in the last four years. The development of the College depends on a large number of Fellows and Members who generously gave their time and effort for the betterment of the anaesthetic community. I would also like to thank Dr. Timmy Yuen and the editorial board for their effort in making this newsletter more readable. Lastly, but not the least, the College would not have functioned properly without the tireless and efficient management of Mr. Daniel Tso.

IMPORTANT NOTICE CME for Academy Fellows

With effect from 1st January 2005, the Hong Kong Medical Council will be introducing compulsory CME that is linked to Practising Certificate, and the renewal of Practising Certificate will be done on a 3 yearly basis to fit in with the CME cycle. To streamline the logistics of reporting CME compliance and practising certificate renewal, Academy Council has decided to synchronise the CME cycle period with the period covered by the Practising Certificate. This means the 3 year CME cycle will start and end at the same time with the 3 year-Practising Certificate. The arrangement will take effect from 1 January 2005 and fixed CME cycles will be adopted in future. To achieve this end, all CME cycles for existing Academy Fellows shall end on 31st December 2004 and a new cycle shall start afresh from 1 January 2005. The compliance to the CME cycle ending on 31st December 2004 will be determined by counting the CME points on a prorata basis according to the following table:

CME Cycle starting on	CME points to be accrued	
	on 31st December 2004 to be CME compliant

All Fellows are advised to take note of the above arrangement and plan their CME activities accordingly. The Academy has announced this in the AcademyFocus and the monthly web news, and shall continue to remind Fellows of this before January 2005.

New Policy on "Fellow ad eundem"

A. Introduction:

The regulations regarding admission of Fellow ad eundem as governed by the By-laws of the Hong Kong College of Anaesthesiologists stipulates that:

- "2.3.5 Election of candidates as Fellow ad eundem shall be by the Council.
 - 2.3.6 Such election shall be held at the meeting of the Council prior to the Annual General Meeting in each year but so that the number of Fellows ad eundem so admitted in each year shall not exceed a number to be determined each year by the Council;
- 2.3.7 Such election shall be by ballot and to be admitted a candidate shall receive the favourable vote of three quarters of the number of the members of the Council present."

HKCA recognises the importance and contribution of anaesthesiologists possessing overseas anaesthesia qualifications who have decided to come and work in Hong Kong. On the other hand, HKCA has to address the issue of supply and demand of specialist anaesthesiologists. At the present moment, HKCA is able to produce enough specialist anaesthesiologists to satisfy the needs of Hong Kong people. It would be reasonable to set a quota for the number of "Fellows ad eundem" to be admitted each year.

B. After the Annual General Meeting of 2004, the procedure for election of "Fellow ad eundem" will follow strictly By-law 2.3.6 and

- B.1 Not more than 5 will be admitted at such occasion.
- B.2 Each application will be vetted according to the spirit laid down in By-law 2.3.2.7, which stipulates that the applicant should have demonstrated a contribution to the advancement of the pursuits of the College in practice, education or research.
- B.3 If there are more than 5 applications, the most deserving ones, according to By-law 2.3.2.7 will be admitted. The total number of admissions may be less than 5.
- B.4 Unsuccessful applicants may appeal to the Appeals Committee against the decision of the Board of Censors, or they may apply again in future when their contributions may have increased over time.
- C. Procedures for application:
- C.1 The deadline for the annual application for admission as "Fellow as eundem" will be announced 6 months in advance.
- C.2 Applicants should complete the Fellowship Application Form and send it to the College secretariat together with supporting documents before the prescribed deadline.
- C.3 All applications will be considered together.
- C.4 Shortlisted applicants will be invited to attend an "Exit Assessment"
- C.5 Successful applicants will be informed in due course.

What makes a Trainee in Anaesthesiology Different?

Anaesthesiology is specialty filled with worries. An anaesthetist should identify problems, anticipate risks and prepare to deal with crisis. This is our bread and butter.

"居安思危" is the motto.

If we extend this mentality to our professional development, what will you anticipate?

The current problems stemmed from the over supply of manpower on top of an anaemic financial budget.

It is now clear that HA will fire those who cannot get the part one examination in the first three years of contract. It is not a melodramatic threat and I really think that it will happen. If you are lucky enough you can have your contract renewed after you pass the examination. How about if you failed? You will be forced into private practice.

It is also clear that HA will possibly fire those contract staffs with fellowship qualification in the coming few years in order to "produce" vacancies for new graduates. It means that you, probably, will be forced into private practice as well.

The message is clear. No matter how smart we are, we will be in private practice soon.

In majority of time, we are dealing with unconscious patient or patient in crash. Our training is so specialized that we are "indivisible" from hospital but unfortunately not an ?gindispensable?h part of hospital. During our training period, we are fully supported by our seniors. Even a fellow may sometimes need help from consultant. Once in private practice, we will be the one who are solely responsible for the patient outcome. Are we confident enough for that?

Worse-still, the business in private sector is now in recession. The no. of GA cases is decreasing because more and more patients are moving to public sector due to various reasons. It is a common consensus that the imbalance of health care utilization between the public sector and private sector will persist further until one day our policy maker wakes up and imposes health care reform. Obviously, we are running out of time to wait for this happens.

One of the unique nature of our specialty is that we can not practice alone. In another words, we cannot practice without surgeons. It will impose additional difficulties in our private practice.

After identifying all these risk factors, how can we prepare ourselves to deal with this potential crisis? Besides private practice, are there any way out?

For the junior trainee, I hope you will pass the examination as early as possible including the H.K and Australia examination. Australia examination is quite essential because it provides opportunity for us to work overseas or even receive further training.

For those who are just "exited". Try to be friend with the anaesthetists in private practice as well as the surgeons. You cannot operate without their help. If you know nothing about private practice right now, you'd better to develop a channel or network.

For those who are almost "exited". Try your best to gain experience from different sub-specialties. Put all the stuffs into your log book as detail as possible because it is the only evidence that you are well trained with wide exposure.

Finally, saving money is always a merit. Reduce all kind of unnecessary spending. It definitely will improve your survival fitness.

Our profession is now in critical condition. Our morale is in historical low. Under the current system, all of us will suffer but some will suffer more than the others. Only those who anticipate well and be prepared survive.
